WATER NEWS

Ad Edge Water Technologies has set a May

20, 2019 date to come out and ready the treatment vessels and put the Arsenic treatment plant in service. Everything has checked out good on the installation portion of the project. The system has passed the pressure testing phase.

When Ad Edge personnel arrive, they will inspect the installation, load the treatment vessels with the E-33 media, disinfect the complete system, direct the water operation personnel in proper operation and maintenance procedures and ready the system to be place into

OTHER NEWS

Office hours will be extended for the Summer season.

Starting May 1, 2019, Ash Fork Water Service office will be open Monday thru Thursday 8am to 5pm. With Friday remaining at the 8am to 4pm schedule. Remember we keep the office open thru the lunch hour, for business as usual. This is going in on a trial basis. It is planned now to extend these hours through September and then go back to an 8am to 4pm Winter hours schedule. Let us know if it works for you.

Ash Fork Water Service has once again applied for 3summer jobs through NACOG of Yavapai County. If our application is accepted the potential applicants will have to be between the ages of 16 to 24, and meet some income requirements. Stay tuned for more info.

I'm excited about a new wireless internet provider working toward getting us an option to Century link service. Stay tuned we could have a live signal as early as mid-Summer. Initial coverage area proposed is line-of-sight from the down-town water tower.

Stone Dam

The Stocking Schedule for Stone Dam has been released. Stone Dam is set to receive 2- stockings of Catfish this Spring. The week of May 20-24 and June 3-7 have been set. Typically, we get 500lbs. of Channel Catfish in each load. Most fish are in the 2-4lb range, but I have witnessed catfish in excess of 7-lbs being released.

We are in the 5th year of our agreement with AZ Game & Fish Dept. on the "Community Fishing Program" and new agreements are being drafted. The AZ G&FD has expressed concern over the road condition down to the water for stocking. Stocking costs will rise to \$1400. An-

nually starting FY 2020. The port-a-potty service has been reestablished.

Planned Summer maintenance to the site include, Trail maintenance (Fay's Trail), trash pick-up, Community Fishing Program Signs, improve a spot for tent camping, (level, bring in some sand) and road improvements on Rte. 66.

Remember this is our nice little spot for recreation.

Let's all pitch in to keep it clean and safe!

We are excited about this new tool and during the process of gathering the information we are in the process of upgrading our water contracts and are proposing a new policy on high-use adjustment (needs Board approval), for 1-time unexplained high-water use (leak, theft etc.).

We are working on the History aspect of our site. Stay tuned. We hope this can help you stay better in touch with what is happening at your water service.

FREE SLASH DROP-OFF

Chairman Craig Brown is pleased to announce the continuation of the annual free slash drop-off program at county transfer stations for two months **beginning April 1, and continuing until June 1, 2019.** County transfer stations are located in Black Canyon City, Camp Verde, Congress, Mayer, Paulden, Seligman, and Skull Valley. Free slash drop off will be held during normal operating hours.

This free slash drop-off program will assist residents in developing necessary defensible space around their homes and other structures that could fuel fires. Keeping fuels managed is absolutely necessary to help avoid uncontrolled fires that can become extremely damaging.

The following items only will be accepted: brush, branches, grass. Leaves and yard trimmings. Items not accepted are: lumber, stumps, roots, cactus, metal and garbage. All slash must be removed from plastic bags.

This program is for residential use only. Commercial loads will not be accepted.

ASH FORK SANITATION DISTRICT

On Friday, April 12, 2019 the Ash Fork Sanitation District held their first meeting since May 26, 2018. It was held in Centennial Park at 1:00 pm.

AGENDA: It was stated that the Budget for fiscal year 2019–2020 would be the same as last year, however, that amount was not revealed. There was no "Call to Public" for questions, concerns or comments from the attendees.

The Sanitation District currently has \$62,114.72 of taxpayer money in its' bank account. Eugene Morley, Clerk/Treasurer of the District, stated there would be up-coming expenses for an attorney and para-legal. There are questions from the Attorney General that must be responded to.

There was nothing to report on any plans for future sanitary sewer problems since the last meeting in May.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:15 p.m. Even though the weather was not conducive to hold a meeting out-of-doors (rain, ice and cold), several interested concerned citizens were in attendance.

When asked if there would be any scheduled meetings for the future, Chairman Richard Pederson replied, "they were going to pick up with future meetings, but no schedule as to when or where they would be held yet."

Ash Fork Sanitation District is one of the Special Districts on your tax bill. Usually the tax payer reaps a service for their tax money, such as: Education from the School District; Fire Protection from the Fire District; Street Lights from the Street Light District; Library Service, etc. But the Sanitation District—what do we reap?

Community Action Network (C.A.N.) held their monthly meeting on April 27th at the Community Center. There were some new volunteers that have come forward to be on the board. The board now consists of: Dale Rhodes; Chairman, Linda Radmann, Secretary; Scott Radmann, Treasurer; Board Members Lowell Joslin, Steve Edgar and Marie Edgar.

C.A.N.s' mission is to help with road maintenance on Juniperwood Ranch. At the present time Richard Ferris is the primary grader for Bullock Road and Floyd Surber assists as necessary. C.A.N. also has an outreach program—finding help for those people that need it throughout the community.


